
SFA Design conjures up Parisian glamour atop the W Hollywood

TRANSFORMING A CAVERNOUS space into an elegant penthouse with the grandeur of a Parisian apartment while also incorporating the laid-back comforts of Southern California living takes a magic touch. Luckily, interior designer Kara Smith of SFA Design has it in spades.

The apartment, one of five that Smith designed in the building, is perched at the top of the W in Hollywood (although it has no affiliation with the hotel). If the setting seems worthy of a debonair spy with an English accent, chalk it up to Smith's experience designing for the family of legendary movie producer Albert Broccoli, famed creator of many James Bond films. Smith, who also designed the Viceroy L'Ermitage Beverly Hills Hotel and florist to the stars Eric Butterbaugh's blossom-drenched atelier, is no stranger to creating celeb-worthy design.

"We made it a large open area with smaller spaces that spilled into each other to counterbalance the home's imposing length, a solution that ended up

creating a more functional design," Smith explains. They installed an entryway at the midpoint, an expansive open-plan living room, and a dining room and kitchen that undulates into a family retreat, creating a sumptuous master sanctuary. It's balanced on the opposite side by two luxury bedroom suites.

Juxtaposed against a panorama of the iconic Hollywood Hills that stretches across the entire apartment, the home's design seduces with an understated mix of elegant materials and sensual textures. Rustic herringbone floors and customblackened stainless steel and glass doors are nods to the space's raw underpinnings. NanaWall windows roll back to invite in the view. High-gloss lacquer finishes and ornate moldings provide an unexpected yet pleasing tension. Custom furnishings, many courtesy of SFA Design, seduce with tactile curves and Art Deco details that could have been pulled from Hollywood's golden age. As Bond said in Goldfinger: "Ingenious and useful too."
