





elationships are the real secret to a beautiful home. Take the long-standing partnership between builder Matt Morris and interior designers Joe Lucas and Parrish Chilcoat of Lucas Studio Inc. When their clients learned that the trio had already worked on a halfdozen houses together, they trusted it was a good match. Their instincts which they'd also relied on when grabbing the house while it was still being built—proved correct. The result is a gracious home that balances modern technology with old-world charm in Manhattan Beach, California.

Though the couple and their two young daughters were drawn to Manhattan Beach's genteel setting—the tangle of car-free walking streets encourages children to play outside while their parents socialize—the family also enjoys its privacy. Morris, Lucas, and

Chilcoat put their heads together to finesse a layout that balances the clients' needs. Flipping convention, they put the den and the playroom at the top of the house, creating a secluded aerie that takes advantage of the location's vibrant light and extensive views of the Palos Verdes coastline.

On the first floor, the open-plan kitchen and living room, fitted with pocket doors that open the area to the outside, encourage neighborly interaction. (The kitchen's two well-stocked wine fridges also help!)

Floor plan in place, the designers—known for their traditional interiors worked within a more modern aesthetic without sacrificing the classic and timeless elements that

make up their mantra. "It's a big thing for us," Chilcoat explains. "While things will invariably change and you'll want to switch things out, you don't want a space that dates quickly."

Though the exterior of the house, with its shingles and gas lanterns, may resemble a 19th-century Cape Cod beach cottage, modern finishes and materials are used inside to bring the decor gracefully up to date. Durable outdoor fabrics ensure that the home is both beach- and kid-friendly, while bright pops of citron yellow and moody teal give the rooms a contemporary look.

The home has a fully integrated state-of-theart audio and video control system. Digitally forward-thinking amenities include a biometric entry programmed to turn on lights, music, and

appliances; iPhone and iPad control; and an intercom that, when engaged, pauses live television. This is a comfortable home that marries all of this modern family's worlds—public and private, adult and child, indoor and outdoor, past and future—into a lovely present.

tips of the trade

Color tips from Joe Lucas No white cabinets! Paint kitchen or bathroom cabinets an "off" color that will give the room more visual interest. Paint trim a darker or contrasting color. This will show off the woodwork and is an inexpensive way to add a statement to the room. **Use art** to add a burst of color to a room that has a more mellow palette.

Wallpaper the ceiling. Use a small, consistent pattern to add interest to the room without having to paper the walls.


